Please note that Communion in one kind is perfectly valid, if you do not wish to receive from the common cup. If you would prefer a blessing instead of Communion, come forward and cross your arms over your chest.

Healing: During Communion, healing ministers are available in the side chapel to anoint you and pray with you for healing of mind, body, or spirit.



Worship with Children: Children of all ages are welcome to join us at both worship services. During the school year, we offer a Sunday School program at 10 a.m. in the Caldwell Room downstairs for children ages 4 - 9, and nursery care for infants and toddlers is available in the preschool classroom next door.






And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,


